#### Speed-Mentoring from the Wings of Hope



We, at the Wings of Hope will be hosting our annual speedmentoring event at the Royal College of Surgeons on 30th January 2016 for pupils in years 9 through 13.

The event, which has historically attracted upwards of 500

students, brings together young professionals from a vast array of industries. Each professional is seated on a table with others from their industry, and each table is named and arranged so as to indicate a particular 'route' which students might like to go down as a career. Students spend 15 minutes at each table gathering information on a whole host of different fields into which they might like to enter in the future. It is the job of the professionals to engage, inspire and inform the students about the work they do and the qualifications they have.

Past participants have given fantastic feedback as to the impact 'speed-mentoring' has had on them and their choices. For some, it provides an opportunity to discuss GCSE options, for others it's a chance to find out more about graduate schemes and post-graduate courses. So whether they are looking at medicine or media, retail or research, or they have absolutely no idea what the future holds, speed-mentoring is an unmissable opportunity for any student.

For all students participating in The Wings of Hope Achievement Awards (WOHAA) programme, the event is free to attend.
